Scholarship Opportunities

Requiring University Endorsement:

- Fulbright Fellowships
Senator J. William Fulbright created the Fulbright program in 1946 to increase mutual understanding between the people of the U.S. and other countries. The Fulbright sends over 1000 students to over 140 countries world wide each year to execute carefully designed research proposals.
- Gates Cambridge Scholarships
The Gates Cambridge Scholarship is a merit-based scholarship established by the Gates Cambridge Trust in order to give students from around the world the opportunity to study at Cambridge.
- Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Graduate Scholarships
The Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship Program is open to seniors and recent graduates who are planning to pursue graduate degrees or professional degrees. The award, which awards up to \$50,000 a year to each scholar for tuition, living expenses, etc., may be renewed annually for up to six years, contingent upon performance.
- The Dolores Zohrab Liebmann Fund
The Liebmann Fund provides Fellowships, up to \$18,000/year, for students pursuing graduate studies (including law and medicine) at U.S. Institutions.

Fellowships to graduate students for study in the humanities, social sciences, or natural sciences, including law, medicine, engineering, architecture, or other formal professional training.

Completion of formal application require, including statement of purpose, letters of recommendation from dean of graduate school and chair of department, recommendation letters from at least two professors, transcripts, tax returns, and GRE, LSAT, GMAT, or other test scores, if applicable. Fellowships are renewable up to three years only upon review of proof of satisfactory completion of the current academic year or scheduled phase of research, which must be submitted each year by Apr. 15th.

Not Requiring University Endorsement:

Applicants may consult but are not required to consult with the Fellowship Secretary or Administrator for the following scholarship opportunities.

Jacob K. Javits Fellowship

Deadline: usually October; run through Graduate School
The purpose of the Jacob K. Javits Fellowship (JKJ) Program is to award fellowships to eligible students of superior ability, selected on the basis of demonstrate achievement, financial need, and exceptional promise to undertake graduate study leading to a doctoral degree or a Master of Fine Arts (MFA) at accredited institutions of higher education in selected fields of the arts, humanities, or social sciences. Eligible applicants: Individuals who at the time of application have not yet completed their first year 2000-2001, and who are eligible to receive any grant, loan, or work assistance and intend to pursue a doctoral degree or MFA in fields selected by the JKJ Boar at accredited US institutions of higher education. Individuals must be US citizens of any one of the Freely Associated States.

Herbert Roback Scholarship

Deadline: early May; run through CGES and SFS/GPPI
Two scholarships of \$7,500 each presented to graduate students currently enrolled, or admitted for enrollment, in a full-time Master's Degree program in public administration, public and international affairs, and/or political science. The late Herbert Roback was a highly respected public servant. During is 33-year career, he become

involved in encouraging talented and promising students to consider lifetime careers in the public service. To honor Mr. Roback, his family and friends established the Herbert Roback Scholarship Fund to perpetuate his work.

The Harold W. Rosenthal Fellowship in International Relations

Deadline: usually late January; through CGES/ SFS

Applications for the Harold W. Rosenthal Fellowship in International Relations are accepted through CGES. The Rosenthal Fellowship provides the opportunity to spend a summer working in the office of a Member of Congress or the State Department on foreign affairs issues. A minimum of two Fellows overall will be selected each year for a three-month appointment. A stipend of \$1800.00 will accompany each award. In addition, the European Community's Visitor's Program, jointly sponsored by the European Commission and the European Parliament, gives preferred consideration to Rosenthal Fellows; to date, the Rosenthal Fellowship has averaged one EVP Fellow per year.

The Fellowship will include independent research on legislation and other international affairs issues. The program will also help to integrate the Fellows into the larger foreign affairs community in Washington, including offices and committees in Congress, the Executive branch, local universities, and seminars in the area.

Harold Rosenthal was killed at the age of 29 in a terrorist attack at the Istanbul airport on August 11, 1976, while traveling to Israel as part of his work for Senator Jacob Javits. The Harold W. Rosenthal Fellowship will be awarded to individuals who can best demonstrate overall familiarity with foreign affairs issues and a desire to take part in government service. Applicants will be expected to furnish a written essay and will be interviewed. Selection of Fellows will be based on the requisite knowledge of government, strength of character, commitment to ideals of international peace and understanding, and the ability to develop new ideas. The Harold W. Rosenthal Fellowship is not only an award, but also a responsibility to serve the memory of an outstanding individual and to bring intellectual vigor as well as personal dynamism to the service of this award.

No more than three students may be recommended by the Graduate School of Foreign Service. The Fellowship program is open to college seniors and graduate students who in all cases must be planning to continue in a graduate level program following the summer Fellowship.
