Program Description: Since 1990, the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation has awarded 10 German Chancellor Scholarships annually to prospective leaders from the U.S.A. (under 35 years of age) in the academic, economic and political fields, enabling them to carry out research projects of their own choice in Germany. During one-year research stays, scholars are also given an opportunity to gain an insight into the social, cultural, economic and political situation in Germany. The scholarship period begins on September 1 and lasts twelve months. In certain cases brief extensions are possible. Command of German is not a prerequisite for application. In addition to the scholarship, the Foundation bears the costs for preparatory German language tuition and an intensive course of several weeks in Bonn.

American Fellowships

American Fellowships support women scholars seeking funds for postdoctoral research leave from accredited institutions. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Candidates are evaluated on the basis of scholarly excellence, teaching experience, and active commitment to helping women and girls through service in their communities, professions, or fields of research. Interested candidates may apply for a Postdoctoral Research Leave Fellowship of up to \$30,000 or a Summer/Short-Term Research Publication Grant of up to \$6,000. Eligibility requirements and application details are available online.

International Fellowships

International Fellowships are awarded for full-time study or research to women who are not United States citizens or permanent residents. Both graduate and postgraduate studies at accredited institutions are supported. The Foundation will award 57 fellowships for the 2006-07 academic year. Six of these awards are available to members of International Federation of University Women affiliate organizations. These fellowship recipients may study in any country other than their own. Fellowship awards range from \$18,000 to \$30,000. The Foundation also awards several annual Home Country Project Grants (\$5,000 to \$7,000 each) to women who received AAUW Educational Foundation International Fellowships between 2001 and 2005. These grants support community-based projects designed to improve the lives of women and girls in the fellow's home country. Eligibility requirements and application details are available online.

John McCloy Fellowships in Journalism, Art, Environment and Urban Affairs

This program awards and funds approximately 30 fellowships annually, with 15 each provided to Germans and to Americans. Fellows travel to the others' country for about one month to conduct individual research or to participate in an organized program. Current professional areas of award include Agriculture, Art,

Environmental Affairs, Journalism and Urban Affairs. Eligibility requirements and application details are available online.

ACG Journalism Fellowship for the Study of German Politics and Society

The ACG Journalism Fellowship enables recipients to conduct research in Germany on current political, economic, and social issues. Proposed research projects should address topics with current political or policy significance in Germany's relations with the United States or within the European Union. Covers the costs of pre-approved international and domestic travel and a \$150 per diem allowance for 14 to 28 days in Germany. Knowledge of the German language is not a prerequisite for the program.

Deadline: Rolling

Goldman Fellowship for the Study of German and European Economic and International Affairs

The Dr. Guido Goldman Fellowship is intended to foster the study of European economic and international affairs. Topics that would fall under the rubric of the fellowship include the formulation of German economic and foreign policy and the evolution of U.S.-European relations. Fellows are required to develop research itineraries in consultation with the American Council on Germany. Award covers the cost of pre-approved international and domestic travel and a per diem of \$150 for up to 28 days in Germany and elsewhere in Europe relevant to the research being conducted. Following the completion of the trip, fellows will submit a report summarizing their findings.

Library of Congress Fellowships in International Studies

These are residential fellowships to support postdoctoral research in the humanities and social sciences using the foreign language collections at the Library of Congress. Approximately 10 fellowships will be available for four to nine months each, with a stipend of \$3,500 per month. Applicants must hold a Ph.D. conferred prior to November 3, and strong preference will be given to scholars within seven years of the degree. Applicants must be US citizens or permanent residents as of the application deadline date, and may be affiliated with any academic institution. Independent scholars are also welcome to apply.

Fellowships for Postdoctoral Research in Southeast European Studies

These fellowships of up to \$25,000 each are offered to U.S. citizens and permanent legal residents for six to 12 consecutive months of full-time research in the social sciences and humanities relating to Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Macedonia, Romania, and Serbia and Montenegro (including Kosovo). These fellowships are funded by the Department of State. Every application for this fellowship should, therefore, state clearly how the proposed research will contribute to a better understanding of the region and to policy-making related to it. Applicants must hold a Ph.D. degree by the time of application, or demonstrate the equivalent of the Ph.D. in publications and professional experience.

Program Description: Marshall Scholarships finance young Americans of high ability to study for a degree in the United Kingdom in a system of higher education recognized for its excellence. The Scholarships cover university fees, cost of living expenses, annual book grant, thesis grant, research and daily travel grants, fares to and from the United States and, where applicable, a contribution towards the support of a dependent spouse. Open only to United States citizens who (at the time they take up their Scholarship) hold a first degree from an accredited four-year college or university in the United States with a minimum GPA of 3.7. To qualify for awards tenable from October 2006, candidates must have graduated from their undergraduate college or university after April 2003. Persons already studying for or holding a British degree or degree-equivalent qualification are not eligible to apply for a Marshall Scholarship.

Alpha Fellowship Program

The Alfa Fellowship Program is designed to provide U.S. professionals (25-35) with direct, meaningful experience in the modern business, government, public policy and cultural environment of the New Russia. The program will place participants in professional assignments at leading Russian institutions in business, media, and civil society. The fellowship consists of a year-long program beginning in March 2006, including seven-months of language training (three-month tutor program in the U.S. and four-month

intensive course in Moscow). Qualified candidates must have completed at least beginning Russian to be eligible. Candidates already fluent in Russian will not participate in the U.S.-based language training and will travel with the rest of the group to Russia in June 2006 for the Moscow Seminar Program, language training and professional assignment phases, which run through April 2007.

Robert Bosch Fellowship Program

Provides young American professionals (23-34) with executive level internships in the federal government and private sectors in Germany. German fluency is required at the start of the program. If needed, language training will be provided by the Bosch foundation in the US and Germany.

The exchange program is intended primarily for young adults (18-24) in business, technical, vocational, and agricultural fields. 75 Americans and 100 Germans participate in the program each year. For American participants, the 12-month program begins in late July, and consists of 2 months intensive German, 4 months classroom instruction at a German University of Applied Sciences, 5 months internship in career field. German language proficiency is not required but strongly recommended.

Program of Grants-In-Aid to Young Scholars

Provides small grants to meet specific research needs not covered by other supporting funds. Examples of appropriate needs are small items of equipment (ordinarily expendable), special supplies, travel to research facilities or to attend relevant meetings, etc. Specifically excluded is general financial support, tuition, living expenses (except in connection with supported travel), and expenses that should have been foreseen and provided for in planning the degree program. Size of awards will be determined individually, but are contemplated to be about \$1,500, not to exceed \$3,000. There is no restriction as to academic field, but the project should be focused on scholarly research rather than commercial or political activity, social activism, or other non-academic goals. Applicants must be enrolled in a program leading to a graduate degree

(Masters or Doctoral) in a member institution of the Consortium of Universities of the Washington Metropolitan Area, on a full-time or part-time basis or conducting research for thesis/dissertation after completion of required course work for the degree.

DAAD-AICGS Summer Research Fellowship Program

\$2,500, one-month fellowship award. PhD candidates, recent PhDs (degree awarded within the last two years) and junior faculty members who are citizens or permanent residents of the US or Canada are eligible to apply. Grants are restricted to the German Studies field. Special consideration will be given to research projects closely related to the Institute's five programming areas and current projects.
