Susan Martin holds the Donald G. Herzberg Chair in International Migration and is the Director of the Institute for the Study of International Migration in the School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University. Previously Dr. Martin served as the Executive Director of the U.S. Commission on Immigration Reform, established by legislation to advise Congress and the President on U.S. immigration and refugee policy, and Director of Research and Programs at the Refugee Policy Group. She is the immediate Past President of the International Association for the Study of Forced Migration and serves on the U.S. Comptroller General's Advisory Board, the Academic Advisory Board of the International Organization for Migration, and the Board of the Advocacy Project. Dr. Martin earned her MA and Ph.D. in American Studies from the University of Pennsylvania and her BA in History from Douglass College, Rutgers University. <http://isim.georgetown.edu/pages/Bios/Susan.html>

Kathleen Newland is the Director of Migrants, Migration, and Development and Refugee Protection Programs at the Migration Policy Institute in Washington, D.C. Previously, at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace; she was a Senior Associate and then Co-director of the International Migration Policy Program (1994-2001). She sits on the Board of the International Rescue Committee, and is a Chair Emeritus of the Women's Commission for Refugee Women and Children. She is also on the Board of the Foundation for the Hague Process on Migrants and Refugees. Ms. Newland is a graduate of Harvard University and the Woodrow Wilson School at Princeton University. B. Lindsay Lowell is Director of Policy Studies for the Institute for the Study of International Migration at Georgetown University.
