Guidelines for Authors

The *Georgetown Journal of International Affairs (GJIA)* is dedicated to exploring the major puzzles and pressing questions of world affairs through thoughtful, assertive discourse. Featuring authors who draw from a wide spectrum of professional experience, *GJIA* integrates the diverse factors driving international affairs into a canvas that captures the complexity of the global landscape. Above all, *GJIA* is forward-looking and aims to reveal new angles and insights.

In preparing an article for *GJIA*, we ask authors to consider the following technical, structural, and substantive guidelines.

Technical Guidelines:

- Articles should be no more than 3,000 words in length and be typed and double-spaced in Microsoft™ Word® format.
- All submissions must be original pieces and not draw substantially from articles previously published.
- Articles must conform to the rules of the Chicago Manual of Style, 14th edition.
- Citations should be in the form of endnotes.
- Authors should include complete contact information including their names as they would like them published, a brief biography for each author of a submission, addresses with zip codes, telephone numbers, facsimile numbers, and e-mail addresses.

Structural Guidelines:

- Arguments must be clearly constructed and substantiated. *GJIA* looks for articles which include the following elements:

Introduction- should state the author's purpose and situate his/her argument in a current debate; should also contain a "roadmap" which lays out the structure of the article for the reader.

Body-each section of the article must be essential to supporting the author's thesis—"every word should count." Every paragraph should begin with a central idea followed by properly-cited supporting evidence. Authors should also remember to address counter arguments.

Conclusion-the conclusion should reiterate the main points of the argument and suggest courses of action. *GJIA* looks for pieces that are not just descriptive, but prescriptive—revealing important, otherwise overlooked insights and translating them into creative strategies for the future.

Substantive Guidelines:

- *GJIA* looks for analytical, nuanced arguments that expand and improve the discourse on international affairs. *GJIA* is *not* looking for undocumented opinion pieces or descriptive pieces that fail to provide new insights on an issue. Ultimately, articles should force readers to think about a subject in a new light and help solve a larger puzzle.
- Authors must always keep the reader in mind. While articles should be valuable for academics and practitioners in the field of foreign affairs, they must also be accessible to students and the wider public. As such, all technical terms should be clearly explained and assumptions about the reader's previous knowledge should be kept to a minimum (unnecessary description can always be removed by the *GJIA* editorial staff).

The *Georgetown Journal of International Affairs* will consider all manuscripts submitted, but assumes no obligation regarding publication. All material submitted is returnable at the discretion of the *Georgetown Journal of International Affairs*.

Memorandum of Understanding
BETWEEN CONTRIBUTING AUTHORS AND
THE *GEORGETOWN JOURNAL OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS*

By signing this agreement, the undersigned (hereinafter "Author") accepts an offer from the *Georgetown Journal of International Affairs* (hereinafter "Journal") to publish the Author's article, interview, book review, or other written material (hereinafter "the Work") pursuant to the following terms and conditions:

The Journal's Rights and Responsibilities

1. Subject to the conditions listed in Paragraph 2, the *Journal* will publish the Work with such editorial and research additions or deletions as deemed necessary by the *Journal's* Editorial Board in consultation with the *Journal's* faculty Advisory Board and the Author.
2. The acceptance in Paragraph 1 is conditioned on the following three requirements:
 - a. That the Work is original to the Author;
 - b. That the *Journal* is able to verify the Author's research. If the *Journal* is unable to verify particular references or facts, the *Journal* may delete the same from the Work; and
 - c. That the Work will not be preempted by another publication. For the purposes of this agreement, "preemption" shall mean the Work has not been, nor will be, published in any other publication subject to the terms listed in Paragraph 4.
3. Should the *Journal* determine (a) that any part of the Work has been plagiarized, (b) that the *Journal* is unable, given its best reasonable efforts, to verify a significant amount of the Author's references or factual content, (c) that the Work has been substantially preempted by another publication, or (d) that the *Journal's* editorial board deems the article inappropriate for publication in the *Journal*, the *Journal* reserves the right to refuse to publish the Work

The Author's Rights and Responsibilities

4. **Withdrawal:** Should the Author choose not to publish the Work at all, the Author may withdraw the Work at any time prior to the date on which the *Journal* begins editing the Work. Following such date, the Author is committed to publishing the Work in the *Journal* but may request that the Author's name be omitted.
5. **Exclusivity:** The Author hereby agrees not to publish the Work in any manner until it is first published by the *Journal*. Author further agrees not to publish the Work in another foreign affairs journal for the first six months after publication of the issue of the *Journal* in which the Work appears. The Author agrees that his or her republication of the Work at any time will be subject to the terms included in a separate Copyright Agreement entered into by the Author and the *Journal* as described in Paragraph 6.
6. **Copyright:** The *Journal* requests that the Author assign the copyright on the Work to the *Journal*. The Author's right to reuse or republish the Work will be subject to the terms included in a separate Copyright Agreement entered into between the Author and the *Journal*.
7. **Warranty and Indemnification:** Author warrants that the Work does not infringe the copyright or other proprietary right of any other person and that the Work contains no libelous or other unlawful matter and makes no improper or unlawful invasion of privacy of any person. The *Journal* shall have the right to extend the Author's warranties to third parties (such as licensees) and the Author shall be liable to the same extent as if such warranties were originally made to such third parties. In the event of any claim or suit arising out of or relating to any breach of the foregoing warranties, the Author agrees to hold harmless and indemnify the *Journal* and Georgetown University or their agents against any claim, action, suit proceeding, or recoveries (including damages, costs, expenses, and attorney fees) which may be made, taken, or incurred at any time by or against the *Journal* or Georgetown University or their agents by reason of any violation or infringement of such rights or occasioned by any other failure on the part of Author to fulfill this Agreement.

NOTICE TO AUTHORS

Section 201(C) of the federal copyright law, 17 U.S.C. § 101-914 (1988), provides that each separate contribution to a “collective work” — such as an academic journal — initially vests in the individual author(s). *The Georgetown Journal of International Affairs*, as a matter of policy and in accordance with Section 201(C), requests that our authors assign copyright ownership to *The Georgetown Journal of International Affairs* and Georgetown University so that we may continue to copyright in *The Georgetown Journal of International Affairs*’ and Georgetown University’s name all materials published therein. In the case of materials written by more than one author, each author must complete one form.
