Army ROTC Scholarships

Four-Year Scholarship

The high school Four-Year Scholarship is for high school students planning on attending a four-year college program. Contact your high school academic advisor or Campus Military Science department for more information. To qualify, you must:

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be between the ages of 17 and 26
- Have a high school CGPA of at least 2.50
- Have a high school diploma or equivalent
- Score minimum of 920 on the SAT (math/verbal) or 19 on the ACT (excluding the required writing test scores)
- Meet physical standards
- Agree to accept a commission and serve in the Army on Active Duty or in a Reserve Component (U.S. Army Reserve or Army National Guard)

Three-Year Scholarship

The three-year scholarship is available for students already enrolled in a college or university with three academic years remaining.

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be between ages 17 and 27
- Have a College GPA of at least 2.5
- Have a high school diploma or equivalent
- Score minimum 920 on the SAT or 19 on the ACT
- Meet physical standards
- Agree to accept a commission and serve in the Army on Active Duty or in a Reserve Component (U.S. Army Reserve or Army National Guard)

Two-Year Scholarship

The two-year scholarship is available for those who have two academic years of college remaining.

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be between ages 17 and 27
- Have a College GPA of at least 2.5
- Have a high school diploma or equivalent
- Meet physical standards
- Agree to accept a commission and serve in the Army on Active Duty or in a Reserve Component (U.S. Army Reserve or Army National Guard)

Green to Gold Scholarship Option

- Scholarships are awarded for two, three, or four years.

- Soldiers with two years of college remaining to complete their degree are considered for two-year scholarships.
- Soldiers with three years of college remaining to complete their degree are considered for three-year scholarships.
- Soldiers without college credit who require four years to complete their degree are considered for four-year scholarships.

Benefits

Green to Gold Scholarship Option winners receive:

- Tuition **or** room and board support
- Additional money for textbooks, supplies, and equipment.
- A monthly stipend for up to 10 months each school year that increases each year based on your Military Science Class.
- Pay for attending the Leader Development and Assessment Course (LDAC) between the junior and senior years of college.
- If qualified, Montgomery G.I. Bill / Army College Fund (MGIB/ACF) benefits.
- Additionally, many colleges and universities offer incentives to scholarship winners. The Professor of Military Science (PMS) at your college of choice can provide further information on what is available at the school.

In addition to the financial incentives, soldiers receive additional benefits as ROTC cadets. These benefits include:

- Leadership training
- Responsibility and Practical Experience
- Mentorship of the PMS/APMS
- Camaraderie

Requirements

- U.S. Citizen (non-waiverable)
- Age - Be under 31 years of age on 31 December of the year you complete all requirements for a commission and a college baccalaureate degree. This is a statutory requirement and there are no waivers authorized.
- Cannot have been convicted of a Domestic Violence Crime
- Have a minimum of 2 years Active Duty as well as 3 months of active duty for every one month of specialized training (waiver can be requested)
- GT score of 110 or greater
- Pass the APFT within the last 6 months with score of 180 or higher, minimum of 60 points in each event
- Be a High School Graduate or equivalent
- Cumulative High School or College GPA of 2.5
- Letter of Acceptance to School of Choice offering Army ROTC
- Letter of Acceptance from the PMS of that Army ROTC Battalion
- Favorable National Agency Check (or have initiated the action)
- DODMERB Medical Qualification
- Be eligible to Reenlist

- Not be a conscientious objector
- No more than 3 dependents including spouse (waiverable)

Division Commander's 2-year Hip Pocket Scholarships

The Army ROTC Green to Gold Division Commander's Hip Pocket Scholarship Program provides selected Soldiers the opportunity to complete their baccalaureate degree requirements and obtain a commission through participation in the ROTC Scholarship program. Each year Division Commanders can nominate deserving Soldiers for two-year Green to Gold scholarships. Units are encouraged to nominate Soldiers under their command who have exhibited the potential for further outstanding service to America and our Army as commissioned officers. The best way to ensure your deserving Soldiers have this opportunity is to encourage them to apply now! Interested Soldiers are encouraged to follow-up with their chain of command.

Interested Soldiers will need to download and complete the above application forms along with this Hip Pocket Guide checklist.

Green to Gold Non-Scholarship Option

The Green to Gold Two-Year Non-Scholarship Option Program is available to soldiers who have completed two years of college, and who can complete their college degree requirements in two years.

Benefits

- A monthly stipend of up to 10 months each school year that increases each year based on your Military Science Class.
- Pay for attending the Leader Development and Assessment Course (LDAC) between the junior and senior years of college.
- If qualified, Montgomery G.I. Bill / Army College Fund (MGIB/ACF) benefits.
- School / State / Reserve Forces Duty Benefits.

Green to Gold Non-Scholarship Option members can also participate in the Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP). As SMPs, soldiers are members of both a drilling Reserve or Guard unit and ROTC. SMPs are entitled to Reserve Component pay of E-5 under this program.

Also, many states offer tuition assistance to Reserve and National Guard soldiers.

In addition to the financial incentives, soldiers receive additional benefits as ROTC cadets. These benefits include:

- Leadership training
- Responsibility and Practical Experience
- Mentorship of the PMS/APMS
- Camaraderie

Requirements

- Age - Under 30 years old on 30 June of the year you commission (waivers can be granted)

- PMS can grant waiver up to 32 years
- For those over 32, waiver requests are forwarded to HQs, Cadet Command
- Have a favorable recommendation from Chain of Command
- Have Completed 2 years of College and be accepted as an Academic Junior
- Have a cumulative GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale

Green To Gold Active Duty Option

The Green to Gold Active Duty Option Program is a two-year program which provides eligible, active duty enlisted soldiers an opportunity to complete a baccalaureate degree or graduate degree and be commissioned as an Army officer upon receiving the appropriate degree.

Benefits

- Soldiers selected to participate in this program will continue to receive their current pay and allowances while in the program (up to a maximum of 24 consecutive months).
- If qualified, Montgomery G.I. Bill / Army College Fund (MGIB/ACF) benefits.
- Normal PCS entitlements
- Leadership training
- Responsibility and Practical Experience
- Mentorship of the PMS/APMS
- Camaraderie

Guaranteed Reserve Forces Duty (GRFD) Scholarships

Guaranteed Reserve Forces Duty (GRFD) scholarships are available through the USAR for students that desire to participate in the Senior ROTC program. These scholarships guarantee that the student once graduated from school and commissioned in the U.S. Army must serve their obligation in the USAR or ARNG. USAR scholarships provide for two years of benefits. To be eligible for the scholarship, students must have exactly two years of school remaining. Contact the Professor of Military Science (PMS) at your school's Army ROTC department to determine specific eligibility requirements.

These scholarships pay up to \$20,000 for tuition and fees or room & board. The student can choose which option they desire. In addition, a \$900 per year book allowance is paid to the student. Also, a cadet stipend is paid per month to the student in the following amounts: \$400 for the junior year and \$500 for the senior year. Cadet may also use the Chapter 1606 or Chapter 30 Montgomery GI Bill (MGIB), if eligible. See PMS to determine eligibility for the Selected Reserve (SR)-MGIB and kicker. The Kicker pays \$350 per month in addition to what is paid by the SR-MGIB. The USAR-GRFD scholarship student must participate in the Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP) with an USAR unit prior to commission. Cadets whom participate in the SMP are paid at the rank of E-5, approximately \$225 per month, unless the cadet was already in the USAR and holds a rank higher than E-5.

Payment of Travel Expenses for Study Abroad and Foreign Study Courses

Cadet Command received DA G1 approval to pay Cadet travel expenses during participation in university sponsored study abroad or foreign study courses. These incentives are available for Cadets pursuing these programs starting in summer 2008.

Boards will be held at this HQ in February and September to review and approve Cadet requests for funding of travel to participate in Study Abroad/Foreign Study courses. The first board to convene is scheduled for 15 Feb 08. Host ROTC Battalions must submit all proposals NLT 11 Feb 08 to the Cadet Command G-3 Culture and Language Program Manager, Mr. JT Fox.

Cadet Professional Development Program (Internship Credit May be Applied by Academic Departments)

The Cadet Professional Development Program (CPDT) provides Cadets with summer training opportunities during the MSL II and MSL III summer months and winter and spring breaks. CPDT is further broken into three sections. Cadet Practical Field Training (CPFT), Cadet Troop Lead Training (CTLT) and Drill Cadet Leadership Training (DCLT)

CTLT is a three track program (CTLT Platoon Leader, DCLT, Internships). Most CTLT positions are linked to a specific regiment of the Leader Development and Assessment Course (LDAC). As a result, attendance to the specific regiment is mandatory. The assigned regiment will not be changed to accommodate personal situations. One exception to this rule is overseas culture immersion internships.

The CTLT Platoon Leader track provides Cadets the opportunity to experience leadership in Army Table of Organization and equipment (TO&E) units over a three to four week period. Cadets serve in platoon leader positions or other positions where a second lieutenant is normally assigned. Platoon Leader positions have a 3-4 week duration depending on the hosting unit and location. Assignments include units that are located CONUS and OCONUS. Cadets are assigned a unit mentor, and are provided on-post lodging and meals via a Dining Facility. This program is exclusively designed for MSIII Cadets after completion of LDAC. There are no exceptions to this policy.

The Internship track offers a myriad of opportunities for Cadets who seek additional training in specialized areas such as scientific application, engineering, nursing, medicine, intelligence, cultural awareness, and language proficiency. The internship types, locations, and allocations change significantly from year to year. Cadet Command is significantly increasing overseas opportunities focused on cultural awareness and language proficiency. These programs are meant primarily for MSII and MSIII Cadets. Select the Internship link to see more information on each program. In some cases an MSI Cadet can request an exception to this policy.

Drill Cadet Leadership Training (DCLT). The 4-week DCLT program provides Cadets an opportunity to apply leadership skills, interact with highly skilled and experienced Noncommissioned Officers (NCOs) and drill sergeants, and improves common task skill proficiency in an Army training environment. Cadets serve in positions with the cadre of Initial Entry Training (IET) and One-Station Unit Training (OSUT) units -- Basic Training. Installations can include Ft. Lee, Ft. Jackson, Ft. Leonard wood, and Ft. Benning. This program is exclusively designed for MSIII Cadets after completion of LDAC. There are no exceptions to this policy.

*****All training that is equal to or greater than 28 days total in length qualifies a Cadet to receive the annually adjusted Cadet pay stipend. The 2007 Cadet Pay rate is \$28.81 per day of training.*****

Cadet Troop Leader Training – Platoon Leader Program (CTLT)

There are two leadership opportunities within the Cadet Troop Leader Training (CTLT) Platoon Leader.

The CTLT Platoon Leader Program which consists of platoon leader positions identified by active Army, Army Reserve, and National Guard units both CONUS and OCONUS. Non-SMP MSL III cadets are assigned to the CTLT Platoon Leader program by their PMS and must successfully complete Leader Development and Assessment Course (LDAC) before proceeding to their assigned position. CTLT Platoon Leader positions do not require an application. Cadets are assigned for a period of three-weeks with CONUS units and four-weeks with OCONUS units. Positions are allocated to each Region via CCIMS. Regions allocate positions to Brigades and Brigades allocate positions to Battalions. Cadets receive an Officer Evaluation Report upon completing the Platoon Leader assignment.

All CTLT positions are linked to a specific regiment of the Leader Development and Assessment Course (LDAC). As a result, attendance to the specific regiment is mandatory. The assigned regiment will not be changed to accommodate personal situations.

Drill Cadet Leader Training (DCLT)

Drill Cadet Leadership Training (DCLT) is 4-week programs that provides cadets an opportunity to apply leadership skills; interact with highly skilled and experienced Noncommissioned Officers (NCOs) and drill sergeants; and improve common task skill proficiency in an Army training environment. Cadets serve in positions with the cadre of Initial Entry Training (IET) and One-Station Unit Training (OSUT) units -- Basic Combat Training.

Non-SMP MSL III cadets are assigned to the DCLT program by their PMS and must successfully complete Leader Development and Assessment Course (LDAC) before proceeding to their assigned position. The DCLT program does not require an application. All DCLT positions are linked to a specific regiment of the Leader Development and Assessment Course (LDAC). As a result, attendance to the specific regiment is mandatory. The assigned regiment will not be changed to accommodate personal situations. LDAC will be followed by a mandatory one-week TRADOC Cadre Training Course and then a three week utilization-tour with an IET or OSUT battalion or company. Cadets can expect to interact closely with drill sergeants, basic training soldiers, and support personnel.

Cadets selected for a DCLT program must complete the DCLT Acceptance Statement and email or fax the signed statement to the CPDT program manager at 757-788-4905.

Prerequisites

MSL III cadets only.

Selected cadets must be in peak physical condition to avoid injury and make a positive impression on new soldiers. Cadets must physically prepare for training using exercises in the TRADOC Standardized Physical Training Guide- BCT

Research or Specialty Internships

Army Science Board Internship Program (ASBIP)

The Army Science Board is a Federal Advisory Committee organized under the Federal Advisory Committee Act. It is the Department of the Army senior scientific advisory body chartered in 1977 to replace the Army Scientific Advisory Panel. The ASB advises and makes recommendations to the Secretary of the Army, the Chief of Staff of the Army, the Assistant Secretary of the Army (Acquisition, Logistics and Technology) (ASA(ALT)), the Army Staff, and major Army commanders on scientific and technological matters of concern to the Army. The Secretary of the Army delegates oversight authority to the ASA(ALT), who functions as the ASB Director.

The Army Science Board, working with the U.S. Army Cadet Command, has established an internship program to offer research, practical experimental work and leadership experience to ROTC cadets.

The ASBIP is a three-phase internship.

1. Plenary Phase - Normally held each year in early spring in Northern Virginia (2 to 4 days)
2. Report Writing Phase - Held at the Beckman Center , Irvine , CA (two-weeks)
3. Panel Reports Phase - Washington , DC (two-weeks)

Prerequisites

1. Enrollment in any science Academic Major.
2. Display an interest in Research and Development or Science and Technology.
3. Maintain Grade Point Average (GPA) 3.0.
4. Meet current APFT and height/weight standards at the time of application and during attendance.
5. Routinely operate Microsoft Office and the Internet.

6. Possess an approved security clearance in the level of secret or higher or interim secret clearance at the time of application submission. Submit verification of clearance to the USACC CTLT Program Manager via fax (757)788-5454.

Cadet Internship Program (CIP)

The CIP program consists of internships with Headquarters, Department of the Army staff agencies located in the Pentagon, Arlington, VA. Cadets applying for these internships must be pursuing an academic major in staff areas listed below.

- Financial management
- Human Resource Management
- Conservation
- Public Affairs (Community Relations & Outreach)
- Computer Science
- Historical Preservation
- Business Management
- Logistics
- Pre-law
- Public Affairs (Media Relations)
- Public Affairs (Communications)

Prerequisites

Enrolled in an academic major that is aligned with the type of internship.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

GPA 2.5 or better in academic major.

Possess an approved secret or interim security clearance at the time of application submission. (Must submit verification of clearance to G-3 via fax 757.788.5454 ATTN: CTLT Program Manager.) Packet is incomplete if this prerequisite is not met.

Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory Internship Program (LLNLIP)

1. Description:

Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (LLNL) is a U.S. Department of Energy national laboratory operated by the University of California. While LLNL was founded in September 1952 to promote innovation in the design of our nation's nuclear stockpile through creative science and engineering, LLNL has also become one of the world's premier scientific centers, where cutting-edge science and engineering in the interest of national security is used to break new ground in other areas of national importance, including energy, biomedicine, and environmental science.

This opportunity is an individually supervised research and study program conducted at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (LLNL). It is designed to provide students a hands-on experience with advanced technologies and techniques and to increase ones awareness of LLNL's stockpile stewardship mission while supporting DoD and a multitude of military projects.

2. Where is LLNLIP located?

Livermore, CA

- One hour east of San Francisco
- Short drive to Oakland and Berkley
- One to two hour drive to Santa Cruz or Monterey
- Two hours to Sierra Nevada

3. Military Academic Research Associate Internship (MARA) for Army ROTC Cadets is the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory Internship Program. This experience is designed to enhance the ROTC cadet's experience and the opportunity to participate in on-going collaborative, multi-disciplinary teams pursuing scientific and technical solutions to some of our nation's most challenging problems, many of which address areas critical to national defense.

a. MARA Prerequisites:

Term:

Summer – appointments usually range from four to twelve weeks (Mid may to August)

Requirements:

- In addition to the Assignment, Electronic Portfolio, Oral Presentation to Technical Peer Group, and Briefings & Tours on DOD/Military Research

Disciplines:

- Engineering (Systems, Mechanical, Electrical, Astro, Aeronautical, Chemical), Physic, Chemistry, Biochemistry, Environmental, Computations, Biology, Lasers, Material Science, Energy, Political Science, Economics.

Eligibility criteria:

- MS IV & V cadets (graduating Dec or enrolled in graduate program) and MS III cadets
- Minimum 3.0 & preferred 3.5+, US citizenship

-Access LLNL's interest form at <http://internships.llnl.gov/rotc> and complete the interest form - specifying project titles and researcher names (this will increase your chances of being successful). Check SPELLING!

- Submit application no later than 15 January for the widest consideration.

Note: Cadet Command approval is required before a final selection is made. However, you can begin the application process before having this approval. Request Cadet Command approval by emailing or faxing a copy of your completed LLNL application to (757) 788-5454 (Attn: CTLT Program Manager).

Receipt of your e-mail and approval/disapproval decision will be provided to you electronically.

National Ground Intelligence Center Internship Program (NGICIP)

This internship is sponsored by the National Ground Intelligence Center (NGIC) located in Charlottesville, VA. Internships are in the field of computer science, computer engineering, information gathering or data mining, and in selected languages. Cadets assigned to this internship will work exclusively in a Military Intelligence (MI) environment and under the direct supervision of MI personnel. Cadets with existing Top Secret/SCI clearances are highly encouraged to apply for this internship.

Prerequisites

Enrollment in: foreign language, information gathering or data mining (i.e. library science), computer science, computer or electrical engineering academic field of study. Cadets who possess linguistics competency as a result of the language being their primary language, the academic major requirement in that language is waived.

GPA 3.0 or better in academic major.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

Possess an approved secret or interim security clearance at the time of application submission. (Must submit verification of clearance to DOLD via fax 757.788.5454 ATTN: CTLT Program Manager.) Packet is incomplete if this prerequisite is not met. Cadets with existing Top Secret/SCI clearances are highly encouraged to apply for this internship .

For linguists, a letter from Language Department professor attesting to cadet's conversational and translation skills in designated language. (Fax letter to DOLD, (757) 788-5454, ATTN: CTLT Program Manager)

Research Internship Program (RIP)

This internship is not sponsored by a specific agency. Rather, this program places cadets in internships with the Army's research and development labs across the country. All MSL III cadets in research or technical programs are encouraged to apply or an internship.

Prerequisites

Enrollment in a science, computer or engineering program

GPA 3.0 or better in academic major.

Meet current APFT and height/weight standards.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

Possess an approved secret or interim security clearance at the time of application submission. (Must submit verification of clearance to DOLD via fax 757.788.5454 ATTN: CTLT Program Manager.) Packet is incomplete if this prerequisite is not met. Cadets with existing Top Secret/SCI clearances are highly encouraged to apply for this internship.

Specialized Internships

Specialized internships will be arranged on an individual basis. Cadets may request this internship only if their degree is not currently covered by one of the regular internship programs or there is a specific internship requirement for degree completion. In some cases special arrangements can be accommodated with in a regular internship to meet the cadet's academic need. Specialized Internships must be requested via the cadet's chain of command only!

Prerequisites

GPA 3.0 or better in academic major.

Meet APFT and height/weight standards at the time of application and throughout the internship.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

Meet any special requirement generated by the type of internship (e.g. TS clearance, CPR certification, meets specific fitness standards other than the APFT, hold a specific rating on a language proficiency level evaluation, etc.)

Degree Based Internships

Army Medical Department Internship Program (AMEDDIP)

The Office of the Army Surgeon General sponsors the program. Cadets are assigned to Medical Department Activities (MEDDAC) and Medical Centers (MEDCEN). The purpose is to offer a cadet insight into the Army Medical Facilities and exposure to leadership in the medical arena. Cadets are assigned to a preceptor and work under their direct supervision and direction of an AMEDD officer.

Locations:

Cadets in the AMEDDIP may serve at locations within the continental United States (CONUS) or outside the continental United States (OCONUS). CONUS locations include, but are not limited to: Ft. Benning, GA ; Ft. Bliss, TX ; Ft. Eustis, VA ; Ft. Leavenworth; Ft. Lewis, WA ; Ft. Sam Houston, TX ; and Walter Reed Army Medical Center, MD . OCONUS Locations include, but are not limited to: Tripler Army Medical Center and Wurzburg, Germany . Locations and positions available change annually.

Target Population:

Cadets pursuing academic majors in: Audiology, Clinical Lab, Dietetics, Environmental Science, Laboratory, Nutrition Care, Occupational Therapy, Optometry, Pathology, Pharmacy, Physical Therapy, Pre-Dental, Pre-Optometry, Preventive Medicine, Psychology, Social Work, Toxicology, Veterinary Medicine may apply for this internship. Other specialty areas may be available. For more information about special areas please email the CTLT Program Manager.

Prerequisites

- Cadets with a Nursing Academic Major are not authorized to apply for this internship.
- Enrolled in an academic major that matches the specific type of internship.
- Have a desire to be commissioned to the Army Medical Department (AMEDD).
- MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.
- GPA of 2.5 or better in academic major.

Central Identification Laboratory Internship Program (CILIP)

The Central Identification Laboratory Internship Program (CILIP) is hosted by the US Army Central Identification Laboratory (USACIL) located on Hickham Air Force Base, HI. The USACIL is a DOD agency responsible for conducting worldwide Prisoner of War (POW) and Missing In Action (MIA) search and recovery missions. Personnel assigned to this

organization travel throughout the year to various countries (ranging from North Korea, Papua New Guinea, Kwajalein atoll and Vietnam) in search of fallen Americans resulting from overseas conflicts overseas.

Cadets assigned to this internship will work exclusively and under the direct supervision of an active duty officer, who is branched qualified in Quarter Master.

Description: Travel with a specialized POW/MIA team to one of the following locations: Republic of Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam, or Papua New Guinea to conduct a scientific excavation (Recovery) of selected sites which are believed to hold the remains of missing US personnel. Supervisor maybe at senior O-3 (USA, USN, USMC or USAF) and an anthropologist.

Special Instructions :

Cadets must bring the following items:

- Military identification card
- Military identification tags
- Assignment orders (5 copies)
- Dental records
- Medical records
- Immunization records

The daily work uniform for the cadet is rugged civilian clothing (i.e. Blue Jeans and light weight shirt). However cadet must bring BDUs and Class B uniforms.

Cadets will be issued TA-50 when reporting to CILIP. Upon completion of NALC cadet is to ship all TA-50 back to school of record.

Upon approval of internship application, the Cadet's PMS or training officer must contact the sponsor as soon as possible to ensure that the cadet has the appropriate shots, passport and visa to enter the country designated for excavation mission.

Prerequisites

- Enrolled in one of the following academic majors and academic major codes: Forensic Science (ECF), Archeology (EAA), Mortuary Science (ETX) or Anthropology (EAX).
- GPA 3.0 or better in academic major.
- MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.
- Possess an approved secret or interim security clearance at the time of application submission. (Must submit verification of clearance to G-3 via fax 757.788.5454 ATTN: CTLT Program Manager.) Packet is incomplete if this prerequisite is not met.

Chaplainry Internship Program (CHIP)

The Chaplainry Internship Program (CHIP) is for MSL IIIs interested in pursuing an academic delay to become an Army Chaplain.

Prerequisites

GPA 3.0 or better in academic major consistent with entry into the academic delay program.

Meet current APFT and height/weight standards.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

Engineering Internship Program

Engineering Internships are hosted by the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and Directorates of Public Works at select Army installations. Cadets assigned to this internship will work exclusively in an engineering capacity and under the direct supervision of an engineer. The majority of the engineering internships are not co-located on a military installation.

Locations

Engineering internships are located across the U.S. and at overseas locations with the USACE.

Prerequisites

Enrolled in Aerospace, Civil, Electrical, Environmental, Mechanical, or Structural Engineering degree. Have a desire to branch into the Engineers (EN) and pursue becoming a part of the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE).

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as exception to policy.

Health Facilities Planning Agency Internship Program (HFPAIP)

The HFPAIP provides the cadet with experience in intensive project management of the medical/research aspects of various medical and research projects throughout the world.

This internship requires the cadet to analyze health-care facility requirements in relationship to the AMEDD Health Facility Life Cycle Management process to determine the most economical facility solution. The cadet coordinates with Medical/Dental Treatment, Veterinary, or Research Facilities, US Army Corps of Engineers, Army Directorate of Public Works, Architect/Engineering Firms and other activities and contractors to ensure the facility will meet required standards and objectives.

Cadets work under the supervision and direction of the Chief, Project Integration Branch. Cadets selected for this internship must meet the general internship prerequisites and specific requirements for each internship position.

Prerequisites

Enrollment in any one of the following major areas of study: Any of the Engineering fields (Mechanical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Biomedical Engineering, etc., or architecture).

Have an interest in any one of the following areas: Health Facilities Planning, Construction, Design, Planning and Programming, Project Integration.

Have a desire to be commissioned to the AMEDD.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

Judge Advocate General Internship Program (JAGIP)

The Judge Advocate General Internship Program (JAGIP) is for MSL IIIs interested in pursuing an academic delay to become an Army lawyer. Interns will be assigned to positions with Staff Judge Advocates (SJA) at Army legal offices.

Prerequisites

GPA 3.0 or better in academic major consistent with entry into the academic delay program (e.g. Pre-law, criminal justice, political science, etc).

Meet current APFT and height/weight standards.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

Prerequisites

Enrolled in Public Affairs or Marketing degree.

MS III cadets have priority. However MS IV cadets graduating December or later may apply as an exception to policy.

GPA of 2.5 or better in academic major.

Nurse Summer Training Program (NSTP)

Cadets with an Academic Major of Nursing are the only cadets eligible to apply for this program. Cadets are assigned to Army Medical Facilities both in the continental United States (CONUS) and outside the continental United States (OCONUS) including Europe and

Asia. NSTP provides nursing cadets with opportunities to develop and practice leadership in a clinical environment. Cadets work side-by-side with an Army Nurse Corps Officer preceptor. To qualify, cadets must submit an application packet through their PMS and the Brigade Nurse counselor to the Cadet Command Chief Nurse. Cadets applying for this program must be certified in Basic Cardiac Life Support (BCLS) and certification may not expire prior to the completion of NSTP training.

Public Affairs Office Internship Programs (PAOIP)

Cadets serve as an advanced trainee in public affairs receiving on-the-job training. Assignments are designed to provide experience and knowledge that will develop the incumbent for public affairs work at a higher level. Cadets interview and confer with functional experts and project specialists to obtain background data and information for use in writing assigned articles and stories for the Hawaii Army Weekly and for release to local, regional and national news media. Cadets organize, write, and edit material to be used in news releases on routine events of non-controversial subjects for the news media. Cadets also suggest topics for stories and features for the Hawaii Army Weekly. Cadets have an opportunity to plan page layouts and select photographs and other illustrative material to attract readers. As competence in work increases, assignments advance in scope and complexity.

Cadet Practical Field Training

The **CPFT** program includes training at Army Schools and special courses for Air Assault, Basic Airborne, Mountain Warfare, Northern Warfare, Cadet Survival Training at USAFA, Cadet Field Training at USMA, Sandhurst Competition and University Officer Training Center in the United Kingdom. Generally, in a typical year, the total number of CPFT allocations

equals approximately ten percent of the cadet population at large. Battalion commanders will prepare, select and send to CPDT only those with the highest potential for completing the CPDT training and for being commissioned. Cadet Command pays for travel. Billeting and mess are provided by the installation in most cases. All cadets must meet the eligibility criteria to be selected. More information on the CPFT program can be found in Cadet Command Reg 145-3, Chapter 3, Section 3. The Cadet Command CPFT representative can be reached at commercial (757) 788-4586.
